Woolton Hill Junior School

Hello readers. This is Erin and Thomas again.



On our first day back to school after Christmas, we celebrated our annual Safer Internet day which had the theme of "Exploring identity online".

The assembly reminded us that we should speak to an adult if someone online has worried or upset us. We also cannot just use the excuse that "it's my online identity talking not me." Each class then completed researched to identify similarities and differences about what we do online.

Later that week we started our new geography topic. We learnt about different countries and sampled some of the food that originated in these countries. There was Swiss cheese, Italian salami, French croissant, English apples, Spanish olives and German sauerkraut (sour cabbage).

Our action-packed day continued with a different practical workshop where we learnt about different types of mountains, we did a volcano experiment (we got some tin foil, made it into a volcano shape, filled up with red icing and then took turns squeezing it so it erupted), a tectonic plate demonstration (we used a piece of chocolate rice crispy cake and pushed it together to demonstrate how tectonic plates rub together). Our favourite part was that we were allowed to eat the cake!

Our last week in February will be Arts Week. We will let you know how that goes in the next edition.

Twenty years ago our speaker, Jenny Carter, had a Speaker's Audition with the WI, a graphics career, was a Cub's Leader, and ran an allotment with her husband

Jenny took 48 of us on a 'tour' of Canada commencing in Toronto and Niagra Falls before concentrating on British Columbia and travelling north.

The dramatic scenery and flora were impressive, with glaciers and the cold being the focus of the journey up in Alaska. We had a glimpse of the Butchart Gardens in Victoria, on Vancouver Island, where a huge quarry had been transformed into the current gardens between 1906 and 1926. It takes 50 gardeners to keep the gardens in superb condition.

Jenny also showed us her skills in Quilting to depict the images experienced on her journeys.

Our next meeting is on Thursday 26 March, when we will explore 'Undercover Work' with John Negus.

East End St Martin's CE Primary School

Making a difference

For those of you who don't know us, St Martin's Primary School is a small school consisting of five classes located in the village of East End. As a church school, our Christian ethos, vision and school values of respect, friendship, courage and creativity underpin everything we do and we are constantly striving to make the world a better place. We wanted to share with you a few of our current initiatives, in the hope that you may be able to support us.

Bukuya School

St Martin's School has a link to Bukuya School in Uganda, which was established in 2006 through the Whitchurch Deanery. In summer 2019, a school family visited Bukuya and found many of the buildings old and in need of repair. We shared photos from this visit in worship and it was clear we ALL wanted to help. We pledged to raise £1500 for a much needed new 4-hole latrine (a set of four squat toilets). The children started their fund raising on World Toilet Day, collected money at our St Martin's Day and Christmas services, and set up a crowd funding page on the internet. This received amazing support and we're delighted to have reached our £1500 target! However the children want to do more. They have just set their sights on another £1000 to pay for metal windows to protect the classrooms at Bukuya from termites. Terracycling

Terracycling is a growing initiative which involves recycling items traditionally not recyclable. After learning about it in school worship, the children were keen to get involved. Initially, we wanted to terracycle everything but, after taking advice, we decided to start small, with crisp packets – all crisp, popcorn and pretzel packets are eligible and they don't need to be washed. There are now special bins in our school for crisp packets and this month we started collecting from local residents. We will be at the Woolton Hill Village Market on Saturday 28 March and would love to see you with any contributions!

Charity Point

Last year our School Council set up a Charity Collection Point. We're currently collecting stamps, ink cartridges, milk bottle tops and foreign currency/old coins. This is already having a positive impact. For example, just before Christmas, we raised over £60 by recycling old ink cartridges. Great news for the Macmillan Cancer Research (the charity we donated them for) as well as for our environment! We would be very grateful for any donations and will be collecting them, along with crisp packets, at the Woolton Hill Village market.

We're incredibly proud of the children at our school and the positive impact they are having on our world at a local, national and global level!



Dear friends,

I am, by nature, a hopeful and optimistic person but when Sir David Attenborough says that we are soon to reach crisis point with regard to global warming and its serious impact on humanity, then I become concerned.

Earth's climate has warmed and cooled throughout history but in the last 250 years we have developed such a globally sophisticated way of life that climatologists agree the impact of burning fossil fuels; uncontrolled tree-felling; rising temperatures leading to polar ice and glacial melting causing rising sea levels; population growth; changes in weather patterns causing problems for food production and water-stressed regions, is likely to be devastating.

The challenges are great but there are some hopeful signs – not least in the awareness of young people to these issues. Someone once said – The present generation does not own the earth; we are stewards of creation and have a duty of care to pass it on to the next generation.

Several positive developments are taking place, for example in India cement producers (an industry which generates huge amounts of CO2) have developed a new method of production which vastly reduces CO2 emissions.

In Denmark a major company is moving into production of the next generation of wind-turbines which will lead to a growing percentage of green electricity.

Across the world botanists are working with local peoples to re-green areas which have seen trees cut down; and a commitment to plant one billion trees by 2025 has been agreed by governments.

Scientists in the USA are developing large-scale production of a new gas which will mean that the dangerous HFC gases used in fridges and air-conditioning units can be phased out.

Trades union officials are seeking ways of helping coal-mining communities and their governments of the need to phase out coal for energy production.

And locally on Saturday March 28 at Woolton Hill Village Market the local churches 'GO GREEN' group has booked the Community Table to share ideas on how we can take this issue even more seriously – do come long.

Tim Escudiar

Woolton Hill Resident, Tim Escudiar, Is Running London Marathon 2020 Despite Losing His Eye-Sight!

Tim Escudiar, who lives in Woolton Hill, lost the central vision in his right eye in 1997. Seven years later, Tim also started to lose sight in his left 'good' eye which forced him into retirement from full-time work.

Tim suffers from Macular Degeneration which is the deterioration of the macula-the part of the eye that's responsible for our central vision. Losing the ability to use your macula largely affects everyday situations such as reading, driving, walking, and even identifying faces.



Non-runner, Tim, took on the challenge to run the Paris Marathon in 2016 with RNIB (Royal National Institute of Blind People) to raise awareness of Macular Degeneration. Despite Tim completing the marathon he was left with injuries preventing him from running that distance for a long time after.

The year 2020 has been named the year of 'vision'. Tim also turns 65 this year. He felt the two occasions combined together were enough to encourage him to get his running shoes on again and enter the London Marathon 2020.

Tim has entered with the RNIB team again in the hope to raise awareness and money for the charity, which has supported him with his own eyesight condition.

Tim said: "RNIB do great work supporting people with vision loss. Raising money for the charity this year seemed the perfect symmetry for my own personal challenges with my sight, the year 2020, and my age!

"My legs are very slowly getting stronger as I run around our beautiful Woolton Hill countryside. I'd hugely appreciate your support and encouragement as I navigate my training schedule through our British winter!"

Letter to the Editor



I do wish you humans would acknowledge that 80% of greenhouse gasses come from fossil fuel consuming industries, which include factories producing processed soya, almond and other somewhat artificial drinks masquerading as milk!"

East Woodhay Local History Society

Our first talk of the New Year was by Dr Hugh Pihlens where we heard about his family's Latvian history. It proved to be fascinating and superbly presented.



At the start of the 20th century Dr Pihlens' grandfather, James, was

interested in politics and freeing Latvia from Czarist Russian control. He was called up for military service but failed the medical as 'completely unfit for service' (even though he lived to 82!)

James joined the Free Latvian Society and was watched by the secret police who sent a search party to the family farm in Barta. James escaped on horseback to the nearest port.

When he got to Liepaja, he smuggled himself in the anchor chain locker of a ship and got to Hamburg, Newcastle on Tyne and eventually, London. Here James worked in a furniture 'sweat shop' in the West India Docks (now Canary Wharf). He was on the verge of returning to Latvia, however he was advised to travel further afield and went to the West Country where he got talking to Rev. Benson.

Rev Benson arranged for James to go and work for his brother. His interest in cars lead to him looking after his employer's cars and being his chauffeur. The wealthy Bensons owned several homes including Alton Towers House where James met his future wife, Carrie.

Mr Benson joined the army during the Great War, and James looked after his property plus a garage business. Later James managed to buy some land and a bungalow where he set up his own garage plus tobacconist, tea shop and bed and breakfast. He secured a deal with Austin cars and Sir Herbert Austin came in person to sign the contract to sell six cars a year!

Whilst James was establishing himself, Latvia had gained independence and some of his ex-colleagues were now in power, including the Prime Minister. James' brother sent a letter by ship to Gloucester. He was encouraged to return and be a part of the Government, but he was now running five garages in Cheltenham and had two children! His daughter tragically got bone cancer and died five days before her 24th birthday. Her mother, Carrie, couldn't bear parting from her family and contact was stopped with Latvia, which was soon to be back in Russian hands following WW2. Contact was not re-established with Latvia until Dr Pihlens' father had a letter from a cousin in 1989. Communication was difficult as the Russians censored all letters and both the cousins died in the 1990s. However, Dr Pihlens' father had written a booklet "Our Baltic Story" in 1985 and it was this that lead to him doing more research.

Since then there have been visits to Latvia by the present family. There was a story that James' father, Peter, had been a noted folk singer. This love of singing right across all three Baltic States lead to 'The Singing Revolution' (1989-1991) where people came together to sing and show they would not be trodden down by the Russians. Every five years they still hold a festival to celebrate their independence. We ended the evening by watching a video of this moving concert.

Our next meeting will be on Monday 16 March at 8pm in the Village Hall, Heath End. Mike Robinson will give a talk on 'The History of Farming'. All are welcome.







