witness our Passing Out Parade and after the celebrations he very kindly gave my father, who had also travelled down for the day, a lift back to our family home in Hampstead Norreys. Phil and I lost touch after that as we were given different postings but I never forgot the summer of 1962 when we were on summer holiday from Locking and we collected provisions from the Woolton Hill shop for a week's stay at the Day's holiday cottage in Padstow, where we made Treyarnon Bay and Constantine Bay our playground; a welcome break from the rigorous training at RAF Locking. All of this came flooding back to me when I saw the name J. DAY imprinted in the paintwork above the window of the old shop on Trade Street during the recent renovation work. Memories, memories!

- 7. Will a search for a consensus develop about N.H.S. funding; and will Social Care be tackled by an acceptance of more funding – probably through higher taxes?
- 8. Will all of us look in the mirror-which the pandemic has held up before our eyes – and grasp this unique opportunity to seriously consider life-style changes that could make a tremendous difference to our future?



Virus Diseases In Agriculture by Mike Robinson

The effect of Corona virus across the world is unprecedented in recent times. However at a meeting some years ago at the Institute for Animal Health at Compton, the then Director was very much of the opinion that the major threat to human and animal health in the future would be virus diseases many eminating from Africa. Also he thought that Avian strains would be most likely to cross the species barrier ie from birds. That, of course, was true of Sars and the current pandemic appears to have its origin in bats. The bird flu virus is carried by wild bird migrations and remains a constant threat to our domestic poultry populations especially with the trend to large flocks outdoors.

African Swine Virus has devastated pig populations in China and the Far East and is moving west maybe encouraged by increasing populations of wild boar.

The devastating outbreak of Foot & Mouth disease here in 2001 appears to have originated from imported South African beef resulting in the loss of 6,000,000 animals in the UK.

In its simplest form control of the virus is by eliminating the source of infection. Unlike bacteria the virus does not have a long life away from the host. Vaccination is always a process of catching up, but does eventually provide some answers. Fortunately and with exceptional foresight high quality research centres were established in the UK both in the universities and industry and now lead the world in the advanced bio-technology of virus research.

Virus Diseases in plants:

Yield losses in many plants can be quite substantial. In most cases a vector is required which is usually aphids of which there are many different types. Each tends to be specific to a close range of plants and is capable of feeding on the infected sap of one plant and spreading it by feeding on another. Although millions of aphids exist only a small percentage will carry the virus, but the damage is done. Mosquitoes, ticks and midges create the same transfer mechanism in animals and humans in addition to close physical contact which is arguably the most serious.

Barley Yellow Dwarf Virus



This disease can be devastating in most cereal crops and can cause losses of up to 50% in yield and quality. It is spread by aphids mostly in the autumn as they migrate from grasses on to newly emerged cereal crops. Application of chemicals as seed dressings are effective, but have been withdrawn from use for environmental reasons.

This disease is indicative of the many problems within agriculture and is one of many affecting a wide range of plants.

Bio-technology and genetics will be at the forefront of controls in the future.

Five minutes later he emerged from the kitchen and proudly placed our rolls (now plated) on the bar. Sadly, both the Coopers Arms and the Post Office in Trade Street are long gone, together with two of the other pubs we visited that day. 



We would like to say a big 'thank you' in the way people have rallied round to help and support others during this time and also our local shops with the way they have supported the community. You will probably know many immediate cases and also have seen many examples highlighted in our weekly newsletters and on social media.

Supporting the two surgeries of Woolton Hill and Kintbury, our drivers have driven across the whole of East Woodhay, Highclere and Ashmansworth parishes as well as many other places including Hungerford, Stockcross, Wash Common, Old Burghclere, Bishop's Green and Inkpen. As of 5thJune nearly 5,500 miles have been driven to deliver over 2400 prescriptions. Our team is also regularly collecting shopping for clients.

East Woodhay Post Offices

I was prompted to do some research into the history of the post offices in our villages by the recent changes to the Old Post Office in Woolton Hill. I think it makes an interesting story. Val

By the end of the nineteenth century every village in Britain had its post office with a sub-postmaster or mistress. 1840 saw the introduction of the pre-paid penny postage stamp system. This in turn led to the creation of a network of post offices to deal with the collection and delivery of mail. With the growth of literacy in the 19th century, the sending of letters and postcards became commonplace. The post office also began to provide a savings bank, postal orders for sending money safely, and access to the electric telegraph in order to send urgent messages by telegram. This of course became particularly important during the two world wars of the 20th century. By the middle of the 20th century the village post office was paying out old age pensions, family allowances, television and motor licences, dog licences, income tax and national insurance stamps. Sub postmasters usually had other jobs as well as dealing with the mail, most commonly as shopkeepers, grocers or bakers. There was also a small army of postmen and women out in all weathers to make the daily or twice daily deliveries. In 1900 East Woodhay had three Post Offices, although there are others recorded as early as 1861, probably just in the front room of a cottage; one of them was near the bridge over the Ball Hill to Wash




John Dunn and his wife continued to run the post office until their son, also called John, took over the business at some time between 1881 and 1891. The Dunns were postmasters, bakers and grocers. They were clearly energetic

and successful as the Reading Mercury frequently gives their address for replies to advertisements or for the purchase of tickets; it also records that in 1872 John Dunn senior opened the first money order office and savings bank. Less than 6 months later, in April 1873, the electric telegraph was laid down to connect Woolton Hill to Newbury. This must have been highly valued by the big houses as well as the ordinary villagers.



The post office at Woolton Hill continued to be central to the life of the village and the bakery side of the business expanded. **Ernest Hill**, who was baker and postmaster by 1911, had several delivery carts and a large staff; two of his bakers lodged with the family at the Post Office.

In 1933 **Harold Gurney** became the sub postmaster, baker, grocer and confectioner. He grew up at East Woodhay Station where his father was the station master. He was followed by **Jesse Scott**, also a local man whose sister taught at the school. Jesse started out as a carpenter but became a wonderful baker whose buns and doughnuts were greatly prized.

Jesse retired in 1953, and was followed by, among others. Jack Dav and John Toal, who became postmaster in 1975. After Jesse Scott's retirement



the bakery side of the business seems to have ended but the bakery ovens survived in the outbuildings behind the post office.

We are very lucky to have kept our post office in East Woodhay. It is now in Broad Layings and is run by **Vaishali and Amit** (known to many as Su and Raj). They serve our community very well, never less so than during the recent Corona Virus crisis, when I think we have all valued their hard work and their patient and cheerful support.



There have been some interesting challenges requested and fulfilled, whether



that be a need for straws for mocktails (a teenagers birthday party, whilst isolated) to nail clippers for someone's dog! And of course it's a great way to distribute this newsletter, without the cost of printing and shoe leather. Our weekly gathering, (all

coordinated through our WhatsApp Group) at a suitable distance from one another, every Thursday at 8pm to clap, bang saucepans, ring bells and blow whistles in support of the NHS has also become a way of raising spirits and celebrating our wonderful community and beautiful village.

East End has always been a welcoming and inclusive Community where everyone is prepared to support and help each other – the virus has only made that spirit stronger as we continue to help each other in times of need.




The council continues to hold virtual meetings albeit with the occasional technical hitch so business goes on pretty much as usual.
