East Woodhay Parish Council

We again have to announce with great regret that another longstanding councillor, Barry Lambert, is stepping down from the council. Barry was chairman of the planning sub-committee when I joined the council some years ago and only stepped down from that rôle a couple of months ago. The council is united in thanking Barry for his past work and offer our best wishes for the future. Alas Barry is not the only leaver as John Morris has also resigned. John has been treading the footpaths of the parish since Hanne Teece left us last year. On the good news front we welcome a returning councillor in the form of Graham Dick.

Electricity. SSE are finally ready to complete phase 2 of the infrastructure network renewal and will be doing work to upgrade the power line that runs North to South through Ball Hill, West of Gore End road. This involved getting permissions from many different landowners which took a very long time to finalise. The replacement line should be more robust leading to fewer power interruptions. Anybody likely to suffer interruptions during the work will be pre-warned by SSE. Weather permitting the work should be largely done by the end of July.

Model aircraft flying. We have had complaints of powered model aircraft being flown in the Parish Field. Not only is this against the current rules

pertaining to the permissive path but is actually governed by Act of Parliament and a complex set of rules which are



too complex to cover here. However B&D also have a byelaw forbidding the flying of model aircraft including drones on any council owned property which includes the Parish field. Anyone wishing to fly models should join a club where they may fly in a regulated zone or find a friendly farmer and obtain his permission.

We also need to remind everyone that the permissive path is just that. A path through the field. The rest of the field is still used for agriculture (silage) and neither dogs nor people should roam over the field.

We continue to hold Council meetings using Zoom and while they are better than nothing they are a poor substitute for the real thing. Any parishioner wishing to view the proceedings can do so by arrangement with the Parish Clerk. Since the rain started after a long dry spell the vegetation has responded by growing furiously. This is not just your lawns but the hedges too. Nesting season is practically over so now is the time to start trimming hedges in particular where they abut pavements and footways which must be kept clear.

East Woodhay & Highclere Coronavirus Community Support

As I write this on 6th July it is difficult to predict how the next few weeks will go regarding the Coronavirus guidelines for our area. This past weekend most local pubs and hairdressers were opening, today Kintbury surgery is open and tomorrow the Yew Tree Garden Centre Café is welcoming customers once more. Are things about to transition to what is called a 'new normal'? However, it does feel to have been a rollercoaster ride for those involved with Neighbourcare and it is worth taking a look at what has been done.

First though, we want to say some huge thanks. Lesley Foden, who has been our Chair and done an amazing job in aligning the team to undertake the additional support of Prescription Delivery, Shopping Delivery, Wellbeing Calls and Weekly Newsletters, has stepped down as Chair. We will write more in future months but do give a big thanks to Lesley for staying on longer than intended to help us support the extra services. Also, we couldn't have done all we have, without the incredible technical support from her husband, Mark Foden. Mark is still helping us with technology but is taking a step back to focus on his work. A big thanks to Nicole Bentham who has stepped down as a call coordinator. Nicole will be missed by so many clients who have so become used to her friendly voice on the phone. As said, more on all these changes in the future.

We are delighted and so fortunate that Sarah Garland has agreed to take over as Chair. As Sarah has been on the committee, we know this will be a seamless transition as we work on the next phase of the activities for Neighbourcare. In the same way we are so pleased that Lisa Banwell and Diana Sketchley have joined Freida King and Chris Sketchley as Coordinators, taking calls from clients.

So, what a few months it has been! It all started following a request in March 2020 from Woolton Hill Surgery for assistance in delivering a backlog of approximately 150 uncollected prescriptions that had built up at the surgery following the outbreak of Covid-19. Mark and Lesley Foden collected the backlog and with the assistance of volunteers cleared the outstanding medication over a period of 3 days.

Subsequently the combined Woolton Hill/Kintbury medical practice closed the Kintbury (KB) surgery for patient access and dispensed all repeat prescription medication from Woolton Hill Surgery (WH) and to deliver all acute prescriptions (these are those that are prescribed following on-the-day appointments) from KB surgery.

To help support the major increase in volume Neighbourcare set up a one phone number system (01635 745 600) and with the help of volunteer drivers arranged to collect and deliver repeat prescription medication from WH and acute prescription medication from KB to patients registered with both WH and KB. This covered not only the Woolton Hill and Kintbury areas but also villages including Hungerford, Combe, Stockcross, Wickham, Wash Common, Burghclere, Crux Easton, Ashmansworth and Inkpen.

WH surgery resumed the dispensing of acute prescriptions for WH patients in June.

Some numbers:

Number of prescriptions delivered – approx. 4000 roughly equally divided between WH and KB patients

Number of volunteer drivers involved – 22

Number of miles driven – approx. 7000

Number of patients delivered to – approx. 1000.

When we set up the shopping service in March 2020 we initially had no idea of the requests we'd receive and how we would facilitate shopping for people. The payment of shopping was particularly tricky. Luckily our two local shops – Woolton Hill Stores and Woodland Stores, Penwood came up trumps and set up an over the phone payment system very quickly. Woolton Hill stores delivered shopping themselves locally and Woodland stores deliver to Penwood and Neighbourcare deliver to those living in the wider area.



Memories of the double-decker 5B bus!!

In the 1950's and 60's the 5B bus travelled from Reading via Yattendon to Newbury with many people travelling to work and delightful children to school. On the bus from Yattendon were Bertha Mott (now Bates) and Jim Hannington, and from Hampstead Norreys Mike Robinson and Christine Edwards (now Fairbrother). Bertha & Christine attended Shaw House, Jim, Park House and Mike, the Newbury Grammar School. The journey was as you can imagine full of laughs and pranks.

In those days school uniforms mattered as they gave identity and, sad to say, a form of hierarchy. The great divide was the sixth year at the Newbury Grammar School when the pupils were given more freedom at school and outside especially, as bus prefects – quite dangerous at that age. On occasions 100 lines would be demanded from younger students as punishment for lack of respect on the bus.

All schools were single sex and none of us was allowed to associate in public, so the journey home was quite a revelation. The Grammar School & County Girls High School had to walk to school in the mornings (and I might add, all together). After school the girls were taken to Newbury by bus, leaving school 15mins before the boys, where we all piled onto the 5B bus and travelled home. One of our 'gang' caught the girls' bus to the wharf for a 'dare' and was expelled from the Grammar School. As the boys walked to the bus on their last day at school, the final act of defiance was to throw their caps over the railway bridge so the oncoming train would flatten them.

Villages were quite isolated with little weekend activities so Monday morning on the bus to Newbury was an event in itself. Mike's personal challenge on many occasions was to tie my long plait to the bar which ran along the back of the seats, causing a great deal of pain when I tried to stand up. Why do you think I have short hair!! Christine lived at a far flung farm in Hampstead Norreys and had to cycle or walk in all weathers to catch the bus. There wasn't any excuse from her parents whatever the weather. Some winters we had very deep snow but we still had to catch the bus. Christine had to struggle home in the dark across the fields and often fell into one of the mucky tractor groves, only to repeat the event the next day. My trip one very

bad winter involved me walking to Hampstead Norreys to catch a bus, as the roads from there to Yattendon were blocked for three weeks. A bus came from Newbury and turned round at Hampstead Norreys to make the journey back. I staggered home several nights in deep snow on what I thought was the road only to find that I was walking on a hedge.

Jim well remembers catching the school bus from Park House to the wharf, often to find the 5B had gone, so it was a mad dash to the Regal cinema to get on there. If there was time he would often buy an ice lolly from Tufnells shop.

We all survived......Mike went to agricultural college and formed Hall Plank Robinson.

Jim completed time in the RAF and eventually went to the USA, where he worked as Director of Training for the world's largest quick printing franchise, PIP, and then ran his own printing business. Christine went to work at British Hoist & Crane, finishing at Limitorque as PA to the CEO, and became Mayor of Newbury in 1988 and 1989 (yes she did serve for two years). Bertha made her mark at Broughton Tyrrell Dental Laboratory, organising many events for the company and completing her time as an executive (and being bossy!!).

So the 5B bus didn't harm any of us and we are all still great friends.





Dear Friends,

What is worse than going into lockdown.... the easing of lockdown! So an article in a national newspaper suggested recently. I have some sympathy with this sentiment.

My experience is of course with how the lockdown impacted our churches. It was easy, even though one did it with a heavy heart, to lock the doors of our precious church buildings. It was the work of a moment, the key turns in the lock and all is secure. Our hearts were perhaps less secure, but gradually many of us became used to it and found new ways to communicate, to worship and pray. Now we are beginning to ease lockdown and worship in church buildings can begin again—and suddenly there are lots of decisions to be made. We cannot just unlock the door and start again, we have to decide about every little or big thing: how to comply with this guideline or that, what is the capacity of our church buildings now, what exactly can we do and how can we make it as safe as possible? It turns out that the easing of lockdown is a really uneasy process!

Is that how it feels for you with the things you are involved with? Having now to consciously make decisions about things that used to be almost second nature and automatic? If this is how it feels for you and for me then we need to be gentle with one another, to give each other time to make those decisions and to find new ways to be ourselves. The world has changed in these last few months in many ways, and sometimes very quickly, and we need time and care—to adjust our expectations of how things we were used to in the past will now be, and to be generous and open in heart to support each other in time of change.

Jesus talks about sharing burdens in Matthew's gospel where he says:

'Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me; for I am **gentle** and **humble** in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light.'

(Matthew 11:28-29).

Perhaps the values of gentleness and humility will help us find peace and our way in the days to come.





War comes to Woodhay! July 28th 1940 by Val Pollitt

In the summer of 1940 a ten-year-old boy was picking apples at his family home in Broad Layings when, to his amazement, he saw a Luftwaffe arm compass hanging from a branch of the apple tree! The boy's name was Frank Baker. That was 80 years




ago but he still lives in Broad Layings. He looked after his treasured find for 68 years before donating it to the Kennet Valley at War Trust's Museum at Littlecote in 2008.



Back in July 1940 a few days earlier local people, including Frank, had been woken by the sound of a German bomber's misfiring engine. The plane was reported to have circled the area several times getting lower and lower. Two explosions and a blinding flash then terrified local people. Maureen Smith, who lived at Hollington, remembered seeing the plane, 'like a burning cross' in the sky as it passed over her cottage. The plane crashed into the carefully tended gardens of the houses in Fuller's Lane where the Brav and Drage families lived. Their vegetable plots were destroyed; ammunition was exploding and trees in an adjoining meadow were in flames, but miraculously nobody was hurt. The following day local people flocked

excitedly to the crash site and many took home souvenirs. There is even a story of a girl taking a machine gun home to East End, although the police soon caught up with her! A young man

who was crazy about planes was quickly on the scene as part of the Home Guard. His name was Peter Hewitt and he was waiting to be called up into the RAF. The next morning his mother and sister visited the site and saw a worried looking RAF officer



who told them that the dynamo from the plane was missing. When they returned to their digs there was a strange petrol smell in the house. They found Peter in his room with the dynamo in pieces; he had brought it home and dismantled it! Tragically Peter was killed just over a year later, aged 19, on a mission with 601 Fighter Squadron.

The Heinkel bomber had been taking part in an attack on the Bristol Aircraft factory at Filton and the Avonmouth dockyards. Its port engine was damaged by anti-aircraft fire before it reached its targets and it was forced to release its bombs and head for home. However, the damage to the plane was too severe and it crashed in Woolton Hill. The impact broke the aircraft into several pieces but the crew of five managed to parachute clear and survived. The German airmen were on the run! Local families locked their doors; the Home Guard was on high alert and soldiers were drafted in to search woodland on the Highclere Estate.

The nineteen-year-old first engineer was the first to surrender and was taken to Woolton Hill Police Station, where he was given a cup of tea and a biscuit. Three other members of the crew surrendered fairly quickly, leaving the navigator, Josef Maskl, still at large. Josef survived for nine days. He tried to head for the coast and wandered through the Penwood area, surviving on stolen vegetables and wild berries. Finally, he was spotted by Lady Buckland of Woolton House and her chauffeur. Exhausted and hungry, he surrendered to them and they drove him to Newbury Police Station where a sympathetic Lady Buckland requested a good meal for the airman.

The excitement was over, thankfully without casualties. Of course, the war continued to have an impact on the people of East Woodhay and Woolton Hill but never again at quite such close quarters!

with others when crops failed. The farrier worked in the forge opposite the War Memorial and we used to ride the large Suffolk Punches from the farm down to the forge to be shod. On a cold day the heat from the anvil was very welcome. On a sunny day we would sit on the seat outside the shop talking amongst ourselves and to passers-by. As an adult I joined the East Woodhay WI. Some members have lived in the area all their life and others have transferred from other Women's Institutes. They all have interesting stories to tell. Today we are part of the North Downs Group joining with Burghclere and Newtown, Kingsclere and Headley Woodlands and more recently Vernham Dean and Linkenholt. All meeting together four or five times a year for speakers, quizzes, craft, skittles and outings.


