Letter to the Editor

Re: East Woodhay Parish Charities

I was very sad to see that the Parish Charities fields have been offered for sale. Whilst I appreciate that the deed of gift, which has stood for over 200 years allows for this sale, it also states that the revenue from this sale has to be reinvested to give an income. As we all know the rates of interest currently are set at an all time low therefore in my opinion this proposed sale comes at the worst possible time. I must question the wisdom of this proposal. I feel that I must also make the point that the Trustees are duty bound to do their best for all the Parishioners of the Parish, as the Charity Commissioners may have a view on their actions.

The land is stated to have equestrian use but this is not so as there has been no change of use application submitted or approved. The company that is offering this land for sale on behalf of East Woodhay Parish Charities specifically stated in their 1990 tenancy Agreement that the only use was for Agricultural Grazing. This agreement also stated that it was not even to be used for allotments.

It is worth noting that horses now come within the scope of recreational animals apart from some shire horses. I therefore believe that our generation are destined to preside over the demise of this age old charity. This has, in the past generations done a great deal of good within our parish.

These fields recently have not been managed well and are in a very poor condition. This I believe is due to a lack of expertise and commitment. The trees adjoining the public footpath are dead and are in a dangerous condition. Also, the hedges are overgrown with the grassland being weed infested.

A considerable sum of money would be needed to bring this back to a usable state. Once the land is sold the Charities have no principal asset.

If I allowed my 20 acres in North End to become as poorly maintained as these fields are, I am sure that I would receive considerable justified criticism from not only the local community but of course DEFRA. I have to abide by quite rigorous standards as do all the agricultural community as we are constantly monitored for the condition and use of our land. It is worth noting that when these generous gifts were made to the parish by these benefactors my forbears were heavily involved in farming within this parish.

It would be a nice idea to give the history of these charities for the newer members of our community.



Who Would Want To Be An Aphid? by Mike Robinson

Aphids are one of the great survivors in the insect world. They have a very interesting, complicated and successful life style and, in addition to the damage caused to crops, they provide a food source for many other insects and small birds. They are in effect at the very bottom of the food chain.

Aphids are capable of producing eggs which can become the over wintering element in their lives. However, many can survive in the adult form in sheltered situations such as grasses and hedgerows for which they have a specific over wintering alternative plant. For instance the rose/grain aphid will over winter on



wild and garden roses and spend the summer having migrated on to cereals and grasses. Eggs hatching in the Spring produce winged forms to allow them to migrate, and set up a new colony. At that point live young which are already pregnant are born at an enormous rate. These new young aphids then produce their own already pregnant live young

after 10 days which are wingless to hugely increase the colony. As time progresses and food supplies become scarce they then produce new winged forms which fly off to establish new colonies. In practice the average life of an aphid is approximately 4 weeks.

Their appetite for nutrient is enormous and they normally congregate at the growing point of the plant such as a wheat ear or a rose bud where sap flow is at its peak. This sap is mostly made up of plant sugars and to obtain all of the nutrients aphids require, vast amounts of surplus sticky liquid known as exudate is produced. This becomes a perfect food for ants and it is often thought that ants effectively use aphids as a form of a dairy farm! Also it is a perfect substrate for black moulds such as Cladosporium and Alternaria growing on wheat ears. Woolly Aphids affecting oilseed rape crops can produce an oily exudate which results in a high risk of combine harvester fires.

Some years ago on a small but important crop of wheat a huge aphid infestation was matched by an equally large population of ladybirds and ladybird larvae. The wheat ears blackened as a result of disease and a period of very hot weather reduced sap flow to almost nil. The net result was total elimination of all the aphids and the ground covered by thousands of ladybirds. The wheat crop also yielded virtually nothing which was a disaster from all points of view. That experience was an indication of the limitations of biological control where a predator is used to control pest infestations. It can work in sealed environments such as greenhouses, but the Cane Toad experience in Australia where they were released into the environment for pest control purposes created



huge problems over large areas. Subsequently very safe, specific aphicides and fungicides were produced to control the problem.

At the time these were applied by air using pilots mainly from Australia and New Zealand who had ex-military low flying experience who travelled the world to carry out this work. They were amazing to watch and offered us the opportunity to fly with them which was rarely accepted! As they were used to wide open spaces the risk of overspraying gardens close to fields was always possible and this form of application stopped in about the early 1980s. These treatments are now carried out using large and very efficient ground sprayers operated by the farmers involved. It is incredible to think that the flexibility and survival of the aphid species is exceptional in the insect world.

Dear Friends,

Battle of Britain Sunday: 20th September

September 2020 marks the 80th Anniversary of the Battle of Britain – a momentous period of dramatic history in the life of our nation. 15th September 1940 saw the decisive climax of an aerial struggle fought over southern England between The Royal Air Force and the Nazi Luftwaffe – with the R.A.F. just about coming through on top.

The context during the early summer of 1940 is important in our understanding of what took place 80 years ago. Following the occupation of much of continental Europe by the Nazi regime and allies, culminating in the fall of France in May 1940, the German High Command had expected the U.K. government to seek peace terms to end the war but, after heated arguments in the recently formed government of Prime Minister Winston Churchill, the decision was made that we would fight on alone. Potentially this could mean that the invasion of mainland Britain would follow in possibly only a few weeks. However, the German High Command knew that, in order to successfully invade the U.K., it was necessary to neutralize the Royal Air Force and destroy airfields in the south east of England so that an invasion fleet could safely cross the English Channel. So the scene was set for the Nazi regime to clear away these two obstacles in their aim of invading our islands; which would lead to their victory in the Second World War. As we all know the Luftwaffe was defeated and the invasion plan was shelved. This momentous period in World War II was the first defeat for the Nazi regime and gave new determination to our nation. In a speech to the House of Commons on 20th August 1945 the Prime Minister, Winston Churchill, paid tribute to the men and women who, in all kinds of ways, contributed to the defeat of the Luftwaffe in the almost four months of the Battle of Britain. In thanking the air crews, the ground crews (of which my father was a part giving particular personal significance to me of this day), the coastal observers, the radar operatives, the ground gunners and those who tracked the ebb and flow of the battle at H.Q., the Prime Minister expressed his gift of inspiring eloquence in his famous words: "never in the field of human conflict was so much owed by so many to so few".

The people involved in the conflict in the early summer to the early autumn in 1940 were indeed heroes and so in this 80th anniversary year we honour them and remember them with immense thanksgiving.

More School Bus Tales!

Bertha's entertaining article reminiscing on her school bus journeys brought back my own memories of travelling from St. Ives, across the tip of the Cornish peninsula, to Penzance on the Southern coast to attend the girls' grammar school. St. Ives boasted a secondary school but the study of foreign language was not available; I am grateful now for my knowledge of French. Pupils from the local Secondary referred to us as "Grammar Sows," the Cornish words for wood lice. Interestingly, the boys' school was named The Humphry Davy Grammar School in recognition of a past pupil, the inventor of the Humphry Davy miners' safety lamp.

So – to tales of bus journeys! Frequently I recall missing the morning bus, running home to rouse my father who, in his pyjamas, would drive my brother and I in pursuit of the bus-sometimes with other cars in the same race! The drivers would then exchange exasperated words as they turned homewards muttering about this disruption to the start of their day. The journey took us through open countryside and one winter the bus became stuck in snow, a rare occurrence, so was unable to proceed. We all joyfully headed home on foot, sliding down icy roads sitting on our satchels!

As to behaviour on the bus-the older boys occupied the rear seats of the top deck singing bawdy rugby songs to the embarrassment no doubt of the conductor at the foot of the stairs and his lower deck passengers! We girls were no angels though. On one occasion the driver left his cabin and angrily confronted us to complain of the noise our feet were making on his "roof" (we always sat in the front seats) and I do remember walking to and fro admiring the passing scenery. I recall a minor accident when an overhanging branch smashed a small sliding window, showering splinters of broken glass over my friend but luckily causing no serious injuries. In due time we became bus prefects and were supposed to ensure berets and caps were worn for the entire iourney; they were not!

Echoing Bertha's comments, this was an ideal environment to gain experience of mixing with boys, as were the joint Scout and Guide Christmas parties and dances in the Salvation Army hall. Great times!

It all started with a letter to The Guardian. In February 1960 Maureen Nicol wrote to the Editor suggesting the creation of a national register of women isolated at home caring for young children. She never anticipated the sacks full of post she received in response–no electronic communication in those days of course! Informal local groups formed and over time a national structure evolved. Today there are groups and individual members all over the world

and the total membership stands at 6218. Over the years the demographic has changed and today's members are mainly more mature ladies but the ethos of providing stimulation, friendship and fun remains unaltered.

The Woolton Hill branch was born when in February 2008 Angie Maxwell put a notice in Spectrum inviting ladies to join a new local NWR group. She explained




