






East Woodhay Parish Council

On the Bike Where We Live

The circular ride is from East End taking in the hamlets of North End, Gore End and Heath End.

The first part of the ride ends in North End (see October's Spectrum). The second part that you can read here, continues from North End.

The route passes two lovely gardens where the WI have held their Coffee and East Woodhay Village Hall where their regular meetings are held (in normal circumstances of course!).

On the right the old telephone kiosk stands just a monument now of days gone by. Perhaps it has been listed and bought by the parish. A fitting tribute to an age when it was necessary to carry the coins to fit the slot.

The temperature is beginning to rise but I carry on making my own breeze. No pedalling for a while as I descend to the adjoining road and finally stop. This is a staggered crossroads with a bend to the left. Not my favourite as I hasten across to the other side. Another hill but I almost make it to the top where I will cross and ride on the loop road to my final route. This road is wider and I choose to get off and walk to enjoy the views across the field, woods and hills beyond. Stepping around a flattened pygmy shrew I admire its simple form and pointed nose. It is still complete, just a casualty of modern age. They are the smallest of all our wild creatures and not often seen. I mount the bike, start to pedal and look up as a buzzard lands on the high branches of an oak tree. Slowly I try to retrieve my phone to take a photo but alas it has spotted me and flies off

across the field. My grandchildren also on bikes spotted a similar bird when we were out for a ride a couple of weeks ago. Could it be the same bird landing on his favourite branch?

Cycling further on the dry, dusty road more cyclists pass in the opposite direction with the customary "Morning, morning." Although it is warm the sun only peeps through the clouds now and then so the temperature is bearable.

Brimstone butterflies and the cabbage white dance before me. The latter is not the gardener's friend as they lay their eggs on cabbage leaves and the green caterpillars strip the plants leaving lacy patterns. Not far to the end now so I decide to walk and exercise more muscles. In the ditch shines the bright red berry of the cuckoo pint. Unfortunately it is poisonous so I only look and carry on. High in the hedgerow on the other side more red berries can be seen. These are the smaller and less bright spindle berry. Wood from the Spindle bush was originally used for making spindles hence its name.

Past the deserted cricket pitch, where there is no sound of leather on willow today, more blackberry flowers have given way to the bubbly looking fruit. A different variety here and will be visited in the Autumn by birds and humans alike. Turning the corner the war memorial comes into view along with the fenced green to stop the parking of cars and ruining of the grass. Soon be home and the day will take another form.

Devastating Dieback

I was saddened to discover that our protected ash tree in the conservation area of North End has Ash Dieback and must be felled, but even worse was the realisation that almost all the ash trees along the lane and in neighbours' gardens seem to be affected.

Having spoken with a local tree surgeon and done some of my own research, I have discovered how the fungus spores spread in the air, affecting new shoots and younger trees more easily. I found much evidence of this on my walk around the hamlet. The fungus attacks trees through the leaves at tips of the youngest branches, so the tree appears to be failing from the "outside" in. There are other symptoms that I'm not qualified or experienced enough to identify, but basically the fungus travels from the twigs into the small branches, on to the larger branches, then to the trunk. It's a one-way process and there is no hope of a "cure". All we can do is fell the trees before they fall causing damage, taking down power lines and/or blocking the road. It's frightening to think that inaction even might cause death or injury if an affected tree were to fall on a car, walker, cyclist or rider.

So, here is my appeal to everyone across the parish (including owners of agricultural land with trees on the verge)... PLEASE check any ash trees you own, get some professional advice if you're concerned, and make arrangements to have affected ash trees professionally felled (with the necessary permissions if you are in a conservation area), before they do any harm. Please check again in the Spring, as not every ash tree is showing signs just yet.

The Woodland Trust website says "it's thought that we are going to lose around 80% of our ash trees in the UK. This is going to have a devastating impact on the landscape and the biodiversity of our woodlands, as well as a major loss in connections between habitats as we lose hedges and individual trees outside of woods". Please—if you can—minimise the long term impact on our beautiful parish by planting another native tree, or even two, for each one felled.



Dear Friends.

A month of remembering...

By custom November is a month of Remembrance for both church and community. All Saints Day, November 1st, is when we give thanks to God for the many saints who, over the centuries, have been faithful in witnessing to their faith – for some of these it meant giving up their lives.

All Souls Day, November 2nd, is when we remember those who have died and especially those who are dear to us. Locally in past years we have held a special service of thanksgiving, in our benefice, to which relatives and friends of local people who have died have been invited – due to current restrictions this has been postponed.

Remembrance Sunday is when we remember the casualties of two World Wars and other more recent conflicts. There were over 60 million casualties across the world in WW2; and over 40 million casualties in WW1. Our traditional Remembrance services and commemorations will be different this year (please see the services list). Keeping of the two minutes silence on Remembrance Day – Wednesday November 11th at 11.00am is a focus of national remembrance and there will still be a National Service of Remembrance on Sunday November 8th at the Cenotaph on Whitehall in London. During 2020 there have seen a number of significant national and international anniversaries. The 75th anniversary of the end of the Second World War in both Europe, the Far East, and indeed across the globe. We have recently observed the 80th anniversary of the Battle of Britain; which was followed by the Blitz which caused such damage to many of our cities.

2020 is also the 75th anniversary of the founding of The United Nations organisation. The U.N. was conceived out of the ashes of World War Two as an international forum to increase political and economic cooperation across the globe. It was one of several international organisations established following WW2 to aid recovery; and over the past 75 years have facilitated an increase in global cooperation among the nations of our world – much remains to be done, but we should be thankful that much has been achieved in the past 75 years.

St Thomas' Church

Churchyard paths - at last!!!

It is with great relief that we are able to write this article for Spectrum, and to say at last the new paths in the lower graveyard at St. Thomas' have been completed. The whole process started in December 2019 (it was originally agreed by the PCC to proceed in July 2019) when we applied to the Diocese for a faculty to install the paths. As many people will be aware the lower graveyard is extremely wet and very difficult for attending a grave or burial.

We were advised by the Diocese to enquire from Basingstoke & Deane council if we would need planning permission – it was not thought to be a problem. Not so, the planning department wanted us to apply for permission, so at that point we had to ask our architect to draw plans and submit them. All went well for a while, then we were hit with the request for a tree survey – just as Covid arrived. We did manage to get the survey complete, but it added a lot more work to the construction. We had to install Geoweb under the paths at the top of the graveyard, to protect the tree roots. The date for the result of the planning passed and we had to wait a further ten days before it was decided we could go ahead.

Our contractors AWG construction from Salisbury fitted the project in when we had some fine weather, so it was all completed within a week. They very kindly tidied the bank on the right of the graveyard, taking away the clay soil left by the grave digger over many years, and made a very nice bank which is being planted with many spare plants and seeds from our gardens. Also to the left of the top path we are planting wild flowers, with the hope that they will flourish in time.

The cost of all this work went far beyond the original quotation (from AWG). In the end the planning application fees, with the tree survey and expensive materials specified by Basingstoke & Deane, resulting in more work for our architect, meant that the cost of the whole project actually doubled. With the final cost being £12,072, we have received a donation from the Parish Council of £500. So please have a look at our latest project, and walk on our lovely new paths.



Local Wildlife We Love

Whilst David Attenborough continues to raise awareness of the plight of our world in his new film 'A life on our planet' we have all become much more aware of nature around us and the wildlife, particularly in our gardens and close to where we live.

Across the world there are threats to wildlife including wildfires and rising sea levels. Locally, the loss of hedgerows, trees, smaller field margins, use of pesticides and pollution of water courses by plastics, threatens the habitats of local wildlife.

Our Zoom meeting in September focussed largely on wildlife we come across in our everyday lives. From the soaring kites with their magnificent appearance to the butterflies such as the Brimstone and Orange tip which frequent vegetation in our gardens, we

are amazed by such variety. Others such as the pheasant and Muntiac deer visit our gardens making themselves at home foraging for food. Down at ground level there are grass snakes laying their eggs in compost heaps and adders enioving the meadows. In ponds, frogs and toads return each year to breed. Hedgehogs can often be seen locally ambling between gardens, being fed to encourage their futures. However, they mustn't be given milk as they are lactose intolerant.

Have you noticed more ladybirds around, particularly in window frames as they look for warmth to hibernate? Our native species has been threatened by the arrival of the Harlequin ladybird

which is both

bigger and competes for the same aphids as food. Bats frequently can be seen at dusk, with the pipistrelle being the most common. The loss of many of their habitats has led to them being a protected species.

Further south on the Isle of Wight, red squirrels flourish as they are not exposed to squirrel pox. These small creatures with tufty ears are a great favourite and the island is one of the last havens for them in England.

Wildlife locally and worldwide is in much need of protection, particularly its natural habitat and sources of food. Individual acts of conservation can help our wildlife flourish in our local, natural environment.

During November, we are due to take part in the NWR Telephone Treasure
