

Canon Christine's role at St Martin's School

The relationship between a church and the school to which it is linked, is an important part of the local community.

Canon Christine has an important role at school. As Rector of the parish, she automatically serves as a foundation governor and she is currently our vice-chair of governors. Her role as a governor is focused on the monitoring of the Christian ethos in the school, she is an active member of the governing body and was involved in the recruitment process when Mrs Bartlett was appointed.

When speaking to Canon Christine, her enthusiasm and fondness for the school is evident. As a church aided school, the local Rector is concerned with all aspects that relate to the school Christian ethos. This includes its Vision & Values, Spirituality and collective worship. Canon Christine has a good relationship with the school. its staff, pupils and parents and is often stopped whilst out shopping or walking her dog to have a chat with pupils past and present. During the past two years, when it has been difficult to come into school, Canon Christine did some wonderful 'live' and pre-recorded broadcasts, to affirm the continuing importance of spirituality in the school community. Now restrictions are being lifted, she is glad to be able to come into school again.

The headteacher, deputy headteacher and Canon Christine meet regularly to discuss and plan ahead, particularly for the whole school collective worships and school services which Canon Christine contrib-

utes to or leads. Each year the school community attends various services at the church and the church community are invited into school for the termly Eucharist service and other special occasions.

When coming into school for worship. Canon Christine uses the parables and stories from the Bible to underpin the school values. She hopes this provides the children with Christian insights for their lives and that it will encourage them to think of the Christian faith as a rich foundation for life, not just for school. Canon Christine says that the new outdoor prayer space, the use of the prayer wall and prayer pebbles in school-where children can add their own 'please', 'sorry', or 'thank vou' pravers-have been wonderful additions, helping the children to be more reflective in thinking through the relevance of the school values for themselves.

At the end of the school year, St Martin's Church presents each Year 6 child with a bible – Canon Christine hopes that they will treasure this gift both as a reminder of all they have

learnt about the Christian faith and also of their time at St Martin's School and its link with St Martin's Church.

or our first February meeting we met in the afternoon to discuss sport. It turned out to be a very varied and interesting session. The definition of sport is "an activity involving physical exertion and skill in which an individual or team competes against another or others for entertainment". After a poll of attendees it emerged that the majority watched tennis, followed by football in second place. Some members were not really interested in sport at all. We discussed how sport was taught when we were young, which recalled some unusual methods for swimming tuition. the benefits of exercise for health and mental well-being and famous sporting moments - again tennis featured heavily in this. Funding for sport was covered, national pride, the social aspect of sport, racism and trans issues in sporting competitions. We learnt that bowls were played in Ancient Egypt but were discouraged in medieval England as they took away too much time from archery practice! We concluded the afternoon with an outline of the rules of croquet and then had an entertaining indoor practice - without mallets!

Popcorn, donuts and chocolate brownies accompanied our second


meeting of the month when the subject for discussion was America. We began with a few background facts on the country which covers 38 million square miles (very roughly the same size as Canada and China) and has a population of over 330 million. A quiz followed on the history and geography of the US, after which we had a go at naming some of the 50 states.

We were reminded of the history of the Boston Tea Party when the colonists of the time objected to paying taxes on tea imports from England when they had no right to vote and dumped the cargoes into the sea.

Then there were reminiscences of holiday trips down the west coast through San Francisco with its older feel and features of the Golden Gate bridge, Fisherman's Wharf and Alcatraz, on to the more modern feel of LA and its surrounds. We heard about white water rafting experiences on the Colorado, the spectacular scenery of the Rockies and the wind-shaped rocks of Monument Valley. The gold panning trail had inspired a circular tour initially taking in Yosemite National Park, Mono Lake (California's Dead Sea) and then on to the smaller gold settlements of the trail itself. We discussed the Standard American Diet (SAD) consisting of ultra-processed foods and the abundance of fast-food

> restaurants which have helped lead to a 40% obesity rate and a serious strain on the US healthcare system.

Bulbs, Corms, Tubers and Rhizomes to Plant in Spring. A talk by Tim Woodland

For many gardeners, despite some long periods of torrential rain and bitingly cold days when hats, scarves and gloves don't really work, February is a time for looking ahead, planning, preparing and imagining. There are signs of new growth everywhere, snowdrops embracing the frost, or even snow, as their name suggests; crocuses, in yellow and purple, bloom briefly only to be trodden on accidentally; and in banks and borders, daffodils spike upwards towards the sun unexpectedly and long forgotten since last year!

These are Spring Bulbs in bloom! But, for the gardener looking ahead, the phrase 'Spring Bulbs' has another quite different meaning. We are thinking about the bulbs, corms, tubers and rhizomes we are about to plant, in Spring. Our heads are full of sunshine and vibrant colours, verdant greenery and flowers of all shapes and sizes tumbling out of pots and filling our gardens.

Dahlias, with mopheads in pinks, oranges and burgundy; Begonias, with so many blooms, you just can't count them; Lilies, so proud of their scent and beauty; Gladioli, so unfashionable now, except in a vase; Amaryllis and Nerines, with names like 'Lipstick' and 'Ice Queen', but you never know if they will last through winter and the ubiquitous Crocosmia which remind you of holidays in Cornwall. Ouick, order a catalogue.

choose your colours, dig out the compost, clean out those pots and start those bulbs and corms and tubers and rhizomes growing. Beware! Some of them are tender! Don't let them get cold! They are not hardy like the snowdrops and crocuses. Look after them well and keep them warm until May at the earliest.

But for us, at the Gardener's Club, in February, there was no need to order a catalogue or research online, learn about the latest growing methods or types of compost – Tim brought his bulbs and information with him to the Church Hall. There was a buzz of excitement and anticipation from our members as they made their purchases ready for summer 2022. And the chit-chat was all about Ranunculus, Trilliums, Colocasia, Cannas, Eucomis and Caladiums. If only Tim could come every February!



The article on tree planting (on the following page) was written by Andrew Davis. Here is a little introduction to him:

Having taken a degree in agriculture at Oxford University, I joined my father in the family farm at Sydmonton. The tenancy was surrendered when the land was sold in 1987 and I then worked for the CLA (Country Land and Business Association) as Regional Director for the South-East until 2004. I have been a part-time lecturer at the Royal Agricultural University, Cirencester, for the past 15 years, retiring at the end of the last academic year.



There are several reasons for planting trees, some mutually incompatible. In past centuries woods were established primarily for sporting purposes, hunting and shooting, which is why we have so many small farm woodlands. These mixed species woods with glades and rides are also good for wildlife, another reason for planting. Then there are forests established for timber, for furniture, construction, fencing, pallets and fire wood. Here the density needs to be greater to ensure tall straight growth with fewer side branches. Whilst hardwoods are planted, the majority is conifer because it is quicker growing. Much of the expansion of forest established by the Forestry Commission over the past century has been of Sitka spruce, but a dense plantation of conifer for timber production provides very little habitat for wildlife.

But the main emphasis for tree planting now comes from the ability to sequester carbon and thus aid in the fight against climate change. The Government's target is to plant 30,000 hectares in England a year every year to 2050 which would take the UK tree cover to 17% from the current 13%. Others go much further; a House of Commons briefing paper suggests 30,000 ha a year by 2024 rising to 50,000 ha by 2050. The Woodland Trust has planted 50 million trees since 1972 and aims to plant the same number over the next five years. Friends of the Earth argues that UK tree cover should be doubled to 26% by 2045.

And yet these targets appear totally unrealistic. In England only 7,220 ha were planted between 2016 and 2020 whilst, in 2019/20, 2,330 ha were planted, 2,100 broadleaved and 230 conifer. In the same year, 10,860 ha were planted in Scotland, 200 ha in Northern Ireland and 80 ha in Wales. The majority of public funding comes from grants in the Countryside Stewardship Scheme which has been roundly condemned as not fit for purpose since it replaced the Environmental Stewardship Scheme in 2014. The process is overly bureaucratic and the grants inadequate. Efforts have been made to make administration simpler and there are now sharp rises in the rates of grants but it remains to be seen whether this proves more attractive.

There are a number of challenges threatening the targets, not just the lack of incentive. The haste with which it is planned to implement them is likely to lead to mistakes and unintended consequences. All are agreed that the right species must be planted on the right soils but it is not entirely clear what or where those are. Planting trees on peat soils is counterproductive as the growth dries out the peat giving off more carbon than is being captured. And yet vast areas of the Flow Country and elsewhere in Scotland were planted in the 1960s, 70s and 80s. Eventually the mistake was realised and, when the trees matured and were harvested, the previous land use was restored, heather moorland in particular.

Another example is much more recent. A dairy farmer in Cumbria sells his milk to Nestle which offers grants to farmers for tree planting. An area of the farm was identified and the proposal approved by the relevant authorities. Once the saplings had been planted, a conservationist with Wild Lakeland realised that this had taken place on a wildflower meadow that contained rare Greater Butterfly orchids. The saplings were removed to be planted elsewhere and it is hoped the wild flowers will recover.

Where are all these saplings to come from? Nurseries in this country have nothing like the capacity required and will take years to increase production sufficiently. As in so many other sectors, a shortage of labour is a serious problem threatening existing activity let alone expansion. But importing plants from nurseries abroad carries major risk and strict biosecurity rules were introduced in 2019 in an attempt to prevent the spread of disease. Chalara or ash die back is caused by a fungus that originated in East Asia. It came into Europe around thirty years ago causing huge damage to the European ash. It was first identified in this country in 2012 in a nursery in Buckinghamshire that had imported ash saplings from a nursery in Holland. It is estimated that the disease may eventually cause the death of 80% to 95% of all ash trees in this country.

Planting trees is not an end in itself. If they are to thrive and achieve the objective of capturing carbon, they must be nurtured and managed. In particular, deer, squirrels and rabbits need to be controlled and unwanted competition removed. There are grants for managing woodland and the planting grants can be recovered if appropriate management does not take place, but there needs to be the infrastructure in place for it to happen.

Has the felling of millions of ash trees and the natural harvest of many others been taken into account in the targets for woodland cover? The premise on which this campaign is based, that planting millions of trees is essential to reach net zero by 2050, is open to challenge. There are other ways to sequester carbon into our soils, as shown by the Cholderton Estate covered in this column before Christmas. It is easy for campaigners to claim that we should cut down on red meat and dairy consumption and then plant all the redundant grassland with trees, but that is far too simplistic a view and one with major implications for our landscape. Of course we should plant more trees and increase the UK's woodland cover, but let us do it in a considered way that avoids unintended consequences and in conjunction with other measures to reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

From the Rector

Dear Friends.

I am writing this as the season of Lent begins with the Gospel reading about Jesus, preparing for his ministry, entering the wilderness for 40 days of fasting and prayer (*Luke 4:1-13*). Even Jesus, the Son of God, took time to prepare and focus on his mission within the bigger picture of God's love and salvation for the world. During this time he was not swayed by temptations to serve his own needs and ego, or to misuse his power. The season of Lent is traditionally one of repentance, sacrifice, discipline and prayer. A time when we commit, like Jesus, to put our own desires aside and focus on our relationship with God. To find our place within that bigger picture of His love and salvation.

Also as I write the situation in Ukraine is fast moving, this war would seem to be born out of an embracing of temptation to self-serving power. I cannot tell, probably none of us can, how things will be by the time April's magazine is published. I am sure many of us know a family or someone who is directly affected by the unfolding tragedy, perhaps with family members still in Ukraine or who have fled and become refugees. We may be asking how we might respond to this turmoil and fear at this time? The Archbishop of York, Stephen Cottrell, has said we must 'be prepared to make sacrifices ourselves... offer generous humanitarian aid... be ready to welcome refugees...' and, as Christians 'pray'. In Lent we remember that these are all Lenten disciplines, and not only Lenten disciplines—also disciplines for the whole Christian life and values which serve our common humanity.

Jesus, in his sacrifice, discipline and prayer, and his life lived for others, stormed the gates of hell and brought forth the resurrection, light and hope which we celebrate at the Festival of Easter. Resurrection and hope which give us the bigger picture we need in troubled times to lift our hearts and inspire us. Let us pray that the light of Christ will shine into the dark places of our world, especially now. Let us pray too that our own sacrifices, discipline and prayers, our own lives lived for others, will help this Easter light of hope shine ever brighter and for peace to prevail.





Speed Awareness:

Since we started the Traffic Calming measures in September, we have now covered 9 locations and have built up a fairly comprehensive picture of the speeding issues throughout the village. The figures below indicate the 85th Percentile speed*, the % of vehicles exceeding the 30 mph limit and the top speed. It is true that the top speed has often been recorded in the evening and that the majority of drivers (85 Percentile speed) are keeping within the 30 mph limit. However, if one takes the information that we have for Woolton Hill road, near to the Junior School during February, it makes for disturbing reading. During the weekdays. between 8 and 9am the average speed of the average 177 cars that passed the unit was 37.1mph. During the afternoon between 3 and 4 pm the average speed of the average 161 cars that passed the unit was 37.5 mph. Given the school warning signs, the traffic calming measures already in place (bollards and road narrowing measures) these speeds are totally unacceptable in the area of a school. let alone a Junior school.

We were pleased to (virtually) meet our PCSO, Joshua Revett

at our February meeting. He reminded us to use 101 to report incidents (or go online to https://www.police. uk/pu/contact-the-police/ report-a-crime-incident/).

Some remedial tree work has been taking place in February and March in both Woolton Hill and Heath End recreation grounds, as well as maintenance on the equipment in Heath End, a valuable use of the Parish precept.


