For most of that time it was a thriving event as local people grew produce, made produce, and generally joined in in any way they could to make it a lively and much anticipated local event.

Over recent years however participation at all levels has declined and now only a handful of dedicated gardeners and craft people take part. We want to revitalise this traditional local event because we believe that it still has lots to offer both as a community event and also to encourage crafts, gardening, and horticulture which are so vital to our general well-being. So, if you have a garden or allotment; if you can bake a cake or tart; if you can make jams or chutneys; if you can sew, knit, take photos, arrange flowers, or do any type of craft, then we need you to join in. It is the taking part that matters! There are also classes for children of all ages with categories for under 5s; 5-8 yrs; 9-12 yrs and 13-16 yrs – So whatever your age you can enter!

Here are just a few of the many classes this year:

Potatoes (5 white)

These are to have been grown by the exhibitor in their own garden or allotment

The show is always held on the third Saturday in August and with your support it has the potential to continue to be a fun and fulfilling local event for all the family. Alongside the exhibition classes there are stalls such as raffle, tombola, plants, cakes, and a few side shows. Any help running the stalls or donating to them would be most welcome.

Lastly we would appreciate ideas for ways to not only encourage more people to take part but also to attract the public to come and support this important local event.

The donations are taken to a warehouse on Greenham where the volunteers send them out checking for age & suitability - who wants out of date food or if your cooking facilities are limited e.g. you might not have an oven!

After being referred by the Social Services, the parcels are delivered to the recipient by car - this ensures that no-one sees a van with a name to identify it. A limit of 3 weeks of food is allowed before a reassessment. The need is great and at the moment shows no sign of slowing so please be generous if you can & are asked.

The Schools of Woolton Hill

The Schools of Woolton Hill's new look!

We're really excited to be launching our new look in September this year as both the infant school and the junior school roll out a new uniform as part of our Federation that has created The Schools of Woolton Hill.

The new uniform marks the next step in our federation's journey to bring both schools in Woolton Hill together and be a physical representation of what we stand for: allowing children to 'let their light shine' throughout primary years, secondary years, and beyond.

We began our 'new look' project by asking the children and their parents what they wanted from their uniform in September. The answers were pretty clear - no ties, not too light colours (to ensure uniforms withstand plenty of outdoor play), and a jumper or cardigan that could be worn in both schools and passed down to siblings and friends. The children are extremely passionate about sustainability and looking after our planet, so the last request was one we wanted to make sure we achieved.

Following the initial research stage we gave the children plenty of uniform options to choose from, and they voted, with the help of our School Councillors, for the new uniform of choice.

We're thrilled to announce that from September there will be no ties, all children can wear a light blue polo shirt (instead of white), and jumpers and cardigans will only include The Schools of Woolton Hill logo which means they can be worn from Year R all the way through to Year 6. What's more we've smartened up our PE kit. Previously, children wore our House colours; yellow, green, red or blue. But now the PE kit will include a navy sports top with light blue details, and navy joggers or shorts.

Finally, to ensure 'old' uniforms don't go to waste, we've teamed up with the charity Goods for Good who will transport the uniform items no longer required to communities abroad that are in need.

The children are really excited to wear the new uniform and it will be a huge milestone starting the next academic year wearing The Schools of Woolton Hill's logo, further cementing the Federation and moving us on in our journey to be outstanding.

Woolton Hill & District Gardeners' Club

The Garden Club's talk in April was 'Big Gardens in Small Spaces' by Martyn Cox. Horticultural Journalist and Author.

The single most transformative project to change a small space, or even no space at all into an oasis of green tranquil-

lity must be the green. living or vertical wall. The 'green wall' was just one of many ideas suggested to us by Martyn in his talk and it was this idea which resonated with me personally. Whichever city I have visited across Europe and beyond, I have always been interested in how the people living there introduce plants into their lives - on balconies, in hanging pots and baskets, planters lining alleyways and 'living green' walls. I was delighted to be asked recently to help in the renovation of a green wall in my son's garden in Thailand which involved dismantling and repotting about one hundred plants. The only concern here was to discover a green pit viper nestling inside one of the pots!

As with many trends in gardening, we often find evidence of similar ideas from times past and I am sure you will all be familiar with The Hanging Gardens of Babylon (Iraq today), dating from 600 BC. Irrigation channels were built to allow spring water to travel from the top of the palace walls through the garden. A similar irrigation system is used at The Alhambra in Granada in Spain. Both examples allow for an exuberance of planting with palms, cypress trees, citrus fruits and vines being grown in a small space. The 'Patio



Festival' in Cordoba in Spain is a celebration of the 'living wall' where traditional terracotta pots are hung on white-painted walls in tiny courtyards. The pots are usually overflowing with pelargoniums in flower and the

presence of water, citrus trees and palms within the patios, create the same sense of tranquillity desired by King Nebuchadnezzar for his wife in ancient Babylon.

It wasn't until 1938 that Stanley Hart White, a landscape architect from Illinois, patented his 'Botanical Bricks' idea. which was the first modern irrigated green wall. This idea has since been developed by Patrick Blanc, a botanist who invented 'Mur Vegetal' or 'Vertical Garden'. Inspired by tropical plants with lush green foliage, low-growing vegetation clinging to high rocky structures and the waterfall habitats of Thailand and Brazil, he has designed green walls for famous landmark buildings around the world, including the 'Caixa Forum' in Madrid, 'Dolce Vita' in Lisbon and 'Paragon Siam' in Bangkok. The well-being of city dwellers is often at the heart of the decision to create a green wall. but research shows that they have other benefits such as animal biodiversity. improvements in air quality and insulation for buildings. Usually, it is simply that people love green spaces and have an overwhelming impulse to create them in any way possible.



An exploration of the Roaring Twenties provided an entertaining and informative afternoon.

It was the age of the movies which saw the birth of Mickey Mouse, an American cartoon character co-created in 1928 by Walt Disney and the cartoonist and animator Ub Iwerks and famous to this day. The first Mickey Mouse Film to be a hit was "Steamboat Willie".

In the early 1920s every movie was silent. Cinemas employed musicians to play the piano or organ to accompany the films. Cinema became the main form of popular entertainment and people of all ages attended the movies, sometimes two or three times a week, and produced the first generation of movie stars like Charlie Chaplin. In 1927 talking pictures began with "The Jazz Singer" starring Al Jolson, a Lithuanian/American Jewish singer and one of the highest paid stars of the 1920s. The "talkies" created such stars as Douglas Fairbanks. Greta Garbo, Mary Pickford, Buster Keaton and Rudolph Valentino, to name but a few.

Dance music resembled what we came to call "The Big Band Sound". Dances included the Black Bottom, the Shimmy, the Foxtrot, the Lindy Hop and the Charleston. Popular songs included "Swanee" written by George Gershwin and associated with Al Jolson.

Flappers were a sub-culture of young western women who wore short skirts, bobbed hair, rebelled against strict protocol, wore make up, drank, smoked, drove cars, and this was seen as a reaction to the end of World War One.

In 1917 alcohol was banned in several American states. During the war there was also a ban on brewing

alcohol from grain because the grain was needed for food and in 1919 Congress passed the 18th Amendment to the Constitution. outlawing the manufacture. transport and sale of alcohol. However. prohibition eventually failed because there were not enough officers to enforce it and the system was corrupted



by organised crime and gangsters (such as Al Capone) who fixed gambling and bribed the police. Also, there were too many Americans who wanted to drink alcohol!!

Huge economic growth followed World War One. Mass production made available to the middle classes goods such as radios, vacuum cleaners and cars. It all came to an abrupt end in October 1929 when the stock market crashed.

So I want to say thank you, thank you to everyone who this summer is giving so much to our communities through the service of their volunteer time and energy. Thank you also to the Spectrum team who month by month work behind the scenes to collate the news and details that add to, and promote, our common life. Through all we do for one another and all of our support for one another we make visible our common life. Long may this continue... and God save the King!

St Martin's CE Primary School

Prayer at St Martin's

rayer is a very important part of St Martin's school. As a church school, worship is an integral part of everyday life but we also ensure that every child understands the importance of prayer and how it can be used to support them and others.

The Worship team, which is a group of children made up of 2 children from every class, is very involved in all areas of worship at St Martin's. They are responsible for setting up the school hall for worship, organising the outdoor prayer area in the nature garden, promoting worship and prayer across the school and encouraging all to become involved.

In the main school hall, the worship table is always set up with our cross, our class candles, prayer pebbles and prayer squares. The prayer pebbles are different coloured glass pebbles which represent the different prayers the children can make - purple represents sorry, green represents please, gold represents thank you and our newly introduced blue pebbles are for mixed prayers. These were introduced following some pupil conferencing where the children explained that sometimes their prayers came into more than one category and then they didn't know which colour to use. The pebbles are left in baskets around the school and the children can take one and put it into the prayer basket in the main hall at the start of worship as they say their prayer.

Also in the hall is our prayer wall, where children (and staff and visitors) can add a 'prayer square'. These are special notes where prayers can be written by pupils, parents, teachers and all visitors to the school. These notes are then attached to the ribbons on the prayer wall – the ribbons are the same colours as the prayer pebbles.

Each class also has a special worship area – this varies depending on the age of the children in the class but every area includes the class candle, prayer pebbles and prayer squares so that children can write their own prayers.

We are very lucky to have an outdoor prayer area, which the children can access at break and lunch times. This is a quiet area where children can go to say a prayer or spend some time in quiet reflection. It has its own special prayer wall, as well as prayer pebbles and prayer squares.



Recently the worship team organised a special a 'pop up prayer space'. This was a tent set up at the front of the school so all visitors could complete a prayer square and add it to the wall. This was a wonderful idea as it really helped all visitors to the school to understand how we value prayer at the school – we even had a couple of visits from members of the St Martin's church PCC to add a prayer. This was so successful that it is going to become a termly event.

If you would like to include your own prayer on our prayer wall then please do get in touch with the school office.

East Woodhay Charities



At our March meeting we were sad to say goodbye to two long serving members: Mary Harcourt who has been a trustee since 1995, and Chris Boreham who joined the Charities as a trustee in 2013. Rev Christine thanked both Mary and Chris for all their hard work during their time as trustees, and particularly thanked Chris for his assistance with the process of the sale of the charities' land.

East Woodhay Charities is made up of two charities: 'Relief in Need' and 'Relief in Sickness'. The charities exist to provide assistance to residents of the civil parish of East Woodhay, either in need or in sickness. All requests for assistance are treated sensitively and confidentially.

Following the investment of proceeds from the sale of charities' land the funds available for distribution have increased, and we have reviewed the application process. In future the trustees will meet in January and July each year, and the following deadlines for grant applications will be applied:

Book/technology grants for first year students of up to £100

These grants are for students going off to college or university for the first time. The deadline for applications will be the 30th June each year. Applications will be considered at the July meeting. This will enable the grants to be paid in plenty of time before the start of term.

Winter fuel grants of up to £200

These grants are for people struggling to pay their fuel bills, especially



during the colder months. The deadline for applications will be the 31st December each year. Applications will be considered at the January meeting and paid by the end of January.

General Hardship grants up to £500 (or £1000 in exceptional

These grants are for when

unexpected costs arise, causing people to find themselves in very difficult circumstances. Because of the nature of these grants there is no deadline for applications. Requests will be considered either at the next scheduled meeting, or between meetings if appropriate.



We had the same formation in mid-January and we had had another several winters ago. Below is an explanation from the Met Office website though more scientific ones are also available.

'Ice spikes form as a result of the way water freezes, from the outside in.

As the 'skin' of ice thickens, if a weakness or hole appears in the ice

skin, the liquid water gets squeezed up through the hole.



The water that is squeezed out then forms the beginning of the spike and the process continues until the tip of the spike freezes.

For an ice spike to form, the air conditions need to be just right. It can't be too cold or the water freezes too guickly, and a little breeze (but not too windy) helps the process.'




