


London Marathon 2023

East Woodhay Charities

At our July meeting we welcomed Clare Waters as a new co-opted trustee. Clare lives in Woolton Hill and is part of the Care Team at the surgery.

The July meeting was the first meeting under the new schedule, which will be kept under review. The accounts for 2022-23 were presented and trustees were pleased to note that the quarterly payments had increased in line with their estimated figures. Not all the income had been paid in grants, it was agreed to continue with efforts to raise the profile of the charities and it is planned to create a Facebook page in addition to our online presence on the Parish Council website.

East Woodhay Charities is made up of two charities: 'Relief in Need and 'Relief in Sickness'. The charities exist to aid residents of the civil parish of East Woodhay, either in need or in sickness. All requests for assistance are treated sensitively and confidentially.

Grants available are:

Book/technology grants for first year students of up to £100

These grants are for students going off to college or university for the first time. The deadline for applications is the 30^{th} June each year. Applications will be considered at the July meeting.

Winter fuel grants of up to £200

These grants are for people struggling to pay their fuel bills, especially during the colder months. The deadline for applications will be the **31**st **December each year**. Applications will be considered at the January meeting and paid by the end of January.

General Hardship grants up to £500

(or £1000 in exceptional circumstances) These grants are for when unexpected costs arise, causing people to find themselves in difficult circumstances. Because of the nature of these grants there is no deadline for applications. Requests will be considered either at the next scheduled meeting, or between meetings if appropriate.

Dear Friends,

Following my letter in October in which I shared news of my retirement this month I want to invite you to my leaving service. This will be at **7pm** on **Thursday 30th November**. It will be held at St Martin's Church in East Woodhay. Please do come and join me as I celebrate my ministry in these parishes and give thanks for the life that Simon and I have been privileged to share among you all.

There are inevitably many memories made over 21 years and so many folks that I have met along the way. For example I have worked alongside 12 headteachers locally and approximately 1,900 children have attended our state schools. I have worked with 20 excellent churchwardens in our 5 churches, 12 church treasurers and 14 church secretaries. Then of course there have been so many church services with the rich annual round of festivals: along with local fetes, activities, community events, homes and groups, solemn Remembrance, and the marking of Royal occasions.

I have not added up the baptism, weddings and funerals I have taken, I prefer to say that these have been one of the greatest privileges of parish ministry for me. They are never a number, but a treasured opportunity to come to know folk a little by walking with them through either joyful or sad occasions in family life. It is so wonderful to bless a couple on their wedding day, to hold a giggling (or even a crying!) baby at the font or to share tears and memories in time of mourning. Thank you to you all.

I have thought long how to close this letter. The words that keep coming to me are those sung by the infant children at St Thomas' School at nearly every Leavers' Service. It is always moving to hear such young children sing words that seem, now I am also leaving, so profound:

'Who knows what tomorrow brings, Where the winds will blow? There will be new songs to sing, For everything must change and grow. Through the laughter, through the tears, In life's ebb and flow, Seize the moments and the years, For everything must change and grow.'

Thank you once more for love, Laughter, tears, prayers, friendship and support shared. As the children sing, and so the scriptures teach there will be new songs for us all to sing...



A fter a series of very enjoyable informal Boules sessions on the Recreation Ground during August, Women in Touch (WIT) launched officially at the beginning of September. On a glorious sunny evening we were treated to an excellent bring and share supper in a member's beautiful garden, and entertained with a couple of somewhat challenging games. Much fun and laughter was had by all.

Our second meeting in September took the form of a book review discussing the two books we had agreed to read over the summer, *The Island of Missing Trees* by Elif Shafek and *The Forgotten Bookshop in Paris* by Daisy Wood. Both books alternate between the past and present, and the links between them become apparent as the stories evolve.

Elif Shafek is a British Turkish novelist and her book tells of a young girl's return from London to Cyprus where her parents were born. She seeks to untangle years of her family's silence about the past but the only connection she has to the land of her ancestors is a fig tree growing in the back garden of their home. The book explores the lasting impact of the Greek/Turkish war of 1974 on Cyprus and the natural world, telling of the displacement, disappearances and destruction caused by the conflict.

We all agreed that it was an enchanting novel. Although harrowing to read in places, it did show glimpses of hope in the tender efforts of some of the island's inhabitants to heal the wounds of war.

The Forgotten Bookshop in Paris links a modern-day middle-aged woman from America, Juliette, with 1940s war torn Paris. On holiday there with her husband, their marriage failing, she craves a new adventure and seems fated to explore a tiny abandoned bookshop. Switch to 1940s Paris and Jacques and Mathilde's creation of their tiny bookshop which is a beacon of hope amidst the horrors of war. We all agreed how vivid were the descriptions of Parisian café life. The link between past and present becomes apparent as the story unfolds. Both good reads combining fictional tales with an element of history too.

Summer Moves Gently into Autumn – The Hydrangea

Taking photographs in sixteen famous gardens in the south of England in exactly the right weather conditions at a time of day when the garden is open but has no visitors, must be quite a challenge. At our last meeting in September, it was apparent that Paul Sievers could meet this challenge admirably as he guided us on a fascinating journey through his slide collection. Certain plants in the various gardens stole the limelight, camellias and magnolias in spring and hydrangeas and acers as late summer moves into autumn. Paul is a well-known photographer who gave us many tips on taking photos of plants, but on his own admission, was not a horticultural expert. Fortunately, one of our members was able to help him out, easily identifying plants and giving the botanical name of the plant. One of those identified was a favourite of mine, Hydrangea aspera and I was reminded of a late summer visit I made to 'The Hillier Gardens' near Winchester (sadly, not one of Paul's sixteen gardens), when the 'Hydrangea Walk' was at its best.

Dappled shade from the deciduous tree canopy, a sheltered position and moist, fertile soil has allowed many different varieties of hydrangea to flourish at 'Hilliers' With colours ranging from white, through to dark blue and purple and blending into pink; some with enormous, rounded flower-heads; some with an open corymb of fertile flowers and long-stemmed sepals, all with tough lance-shaped leaves in pairs, I had to examine each label carefully to discover more! And maybe that's the difference between photography and horticulture – one person looks for the correct angle and light to take a photo and another person reads the label to learn more about the plant! My absolute favourite variety of Hydrangea aspera is 'Velvet and Lace'. The petals and sepals are an intense shade of blue. This is not due to a pigment, as in most flowers, but is caused by the availability of aluminium ions in acid soil. This means that colour changes can occur in the flowers from year to year or during the flowering season and even within different blooms on the same plant, so the 'Hydrangea Walk' at 'Hilliers' will probably look guite different on each visit.

'Hydra', the Greek word for water gives us a good indication of why the hydrangeas have been flowering so well this wet summer! Many of these plants originate from the Himalayas and cooler parts of China in higher altitudes, so they thrive in wet, cool weather conditions. In Latin, the word 'asper' means rough, harsh or severe which, in this case, refers to the roughness of the hairy leaves of the aspera 'Villosa Group' of hydrangeas, but could equally refer to their ability to survive in a harsh climate; these are the hardiest species of hydrangea.



My own garden already has its hydrangeas – just two, both 'paniculata' varieties, but still with the open 'lace-cap' inflorescences and they are equally beautiful. They like similar conditions to the 'aspera' group but can take harder pruning in spring as they flower on new wood. If you are fortunate enough to own a Hydrangea aspera 'Velvet and Lace', only prune gently as these varieties flower on old wood. You may be interested to know that this plant has a Royal Horticultural Society 'Award of Garden Merit' in recognition of a truly remarkable garden plant.




