### Women in Touch

The Unlikely Pilgrimage of Harold Fry, starring Jim Broadbent and Penelope Wilton, was the film chosen for our annual film night. When Harold Fry leaves to post a letter to his dying friend he is drained by life, full of self-loathing and incapable of mending his ruined marriage. Instead of sending the letter he just keeps walking, 500 miles from Devon to Berwick-upon-Tweed, in the belief that the journey will save his friend's life.



Solitude forces Harold to confront his personal demons. Simply walking requires

behaviour that's totally out of character; an ability to connect with both nature and humankind. He draws the strength to keep going from his newfound awareness of nature's intricate beauty. The humanity of random strangers, those 'great unwashed' he's spent a lifetime tuning out, offer insight and comfort. Harold abides by the British unspoken rule not to ask for help, yet it is constantly offered, and with great civility.

It's an unapologetically sentimental film, though not cloyingly so. And it's a great adult love story that deals unflinchingly with the challenges of lifelong commitment. It focuses on the value of friendship, humility, self-forgiveness, and human kindness.

Our second meeting was a talk by Sarah Somerville on Shaw House. It was built in 1581 for Thomas Dolman whose family had made their wealth through the cloth trade in Newbury. Little has changed to the external architecture of the House, although internal changes have occurred throughout the years showing the varied uses of the home.

Six generations of the Dolman family lived at Shaw House, welcoming royalty including Queen Elizabeth I and Queen Anne, as well as witnessing battles during the English Civil War. In later years, Shaw House was owned by the Duke of Chandos, the Andrews and Eyre family and lastly the Farquhar family. The Farquhars sold the House and estate at the end of the Second World War to the council who used it as a school for over forty years.

Following funding the 21st century restoration made the building safe for use and



it now welcomes thousands of people each year. The main role of the House is as a business and conference centre, alongside being a heritage venue for a year-round programme of events. The House remains a place of significant historical interest and visitors are welcome to explore the House, Exhibition Rooms and Grounds, free of charge, on select days of opening between February and September.



#### **English Sparkling Wine or Champagne?**

At the end of November, for our first meeting at the Church Hall for over a year, it was delightful to welcome Jonathan Rogers, the owner of The Solent Wine Company. Jonathan has maintained a lifelong passion for wine making and was one of the first cohort of students at the first university degree course in viticulture in Brighton. Although we were a small group on that evening, I have never previously heard our members ask so many questions. A good indication that we thoroughly enjoyed his talk.

We were not surprised to learn that the Romans were the first to import wine into this country and that by 596 AD Augustine monks were cultivating grapes and making their own wine for the communion. The Domesday Book in 1086 recorded vineyards in forty-two distinct locations in Britain, with the most well-known places being Leeds Castle in Kent and Beaulieu Abbey in Hampshire. In 1945 Ray Barrington Brock experimented with growing different grape varieties and soon realised that the German varieties were the most successful in our climate. Only six years later, the first commercial vineyard was established at Hambledon. Today, there are 900 vineyards, mainly located in the south of England with a 70% increase in hectares planted during the last five years.

Pinot Noir, Chardonnay and Pinot Meunier are the main grape varieties grown in these vineyards.

Many of you will be aware of the term 'terroir' which refers to the many different aspects that affect the quality of wine - soil. the angle of slope, microclimate, presence of trees or water. The geological map of the Paris Basin clearly demonstrates why the southern counties of England share similar characteristics with the Champagne region of France. A description of this region will sound familiar! Chalky soils which allow water to drain away whilst retaining sufficient moisture for cultivating the vines due to the seasonal rise and fall of the water table in the limestone rocks: the chalk's ability to reflect sunlight back on to the maturing grapes and the presence of iron and trace minerals in the topsoil to feed the

French 'Champagne', Spanish 'Cava' and 'English Sparkling Wine' all share a similar production method. The secondary fermentation takes place in bottles which then have to be turned in a riddling rack to move the 'leaze' (created by the yeast in the fermentation process) into the neck of the bottle. This leaze then has to be removed



carefully from each bottle, either by hand, by freezing or by machine, whilst retaining the fizz in the bottle. Hence the difference in price between these wines and 'Prosecco' in which the secondary fermentation takes place in a tank, not in a bottle, making it much easier to remove the leaze and hence, reduce the price. By the time you read this article, my family may well have chosen an 'English Sparkling Wine' in favour of the French Champagne, the Spanish Cava or even the Italian Prosecco for our Christmas lunch. Or we may just be tasting that bottle of Sparkling Pink Currant made from the berries of 'Gloire de Sablon' from our allotment. I will let you know!

### East Woodhay Local History Society

The History Society welcomed David Peacock, to talk to us about the River Kennet through history which proved to be fascinating. The river between Newbury & Reading was navigated in the 1700s – before the main period of canal building. This navigation was made possible, by the construction of locks (even though it was not a canal) to maintain a steady flow of water.



There were many mills, such as Ham Mill, on both the Kennet & the River Lambourn. These were all for milling corn originally but some changed to fulling mills. This pounding process removed oils from cloth to enable it to felt.

David's maps showed that, where the library & taxi rank now are by the Granary Warehouse at the Wharf, there was a channel from the river to allow direct unloading.

John Rennie, one of the main canal builders, was involved when the canal was built westwards & apparently, tried out various designs of lock to discover the



most effective one. The owner of the canal also owned a quarry near Bath. When St Laurence's church at Hungerford needed re-building, he sent stone for the work thus enjoying income from both aspects of the contract!

This month's meeting is on Monday 15th January at 8pm in the Village Hall, Heath End. It will be our AGM plus short talks by members of the society with wine & nibbles to end. May I remind members that subscriptions will be due.





#### **New Year Traditions**

Jow do you celebrate New Year? For many years, whatever the weather, Suzie and I have made a picnic and taken our children to sit overlooking the lighthouse on Strumble Head, nr. Fishguard in Pembrokeshire. We had a farmhouse round the coast but loved the view from there, come rain or shine, cold or frost, out to the Atlantic. It became a tradition not because the weather was always fine – although it was often sunny and usually milder – but because the view never changed. Cliffs that had stood for millions of years rising from the boiling Atlantic. Seagulls and choughs, peregrine falcon and whinchat, soaring skywards, buffeted by the wind but, it seemed, enjoying every minute of it (as we did). How good some things never change!

What are your New Year traditions? Auld Lang Syne and coals carried across the threshold? Turkey sandwiches and a brisk walk? A dip in the sea, a shoot with friends, a New Year soccer fixture, tidying the garden before January and February's frost and snow? I searched 'New Year Traditions' and found an article in Glamour magazine (not a regular read, I hasten to add!) It lists 19 New Year traditions from around the world. Some are for midnight on December 31, like watching the ball fall in Times Square, eating twelve grapes to ward off evil in Spain, burning an effigy in India to consume the old year. Others involve food or activities on January 1, like heading to the beach in Brazil or to a frozen lake for fishing in Canada, sharing joumou (pumpkin) soup in Haiti or twelve round fruit in the Philippines, giving homemade tomales in Mexico, or chucking plates at your friends (!) in Denmark. Few people and places haven't got their own way of seeing out the old and ushering in the New Year ... propitiously.

I hope you have your own New Year traditions. Let me commend ours for a moment. It has three features that, like all good traditions, help us weather the storms of life. First, it is something we all enjoy. Family time matters. It reminds us who we are and how much we depend on loved ones. Second, it is out of the ordinary (and sometimes cold and wet!) that helps to put the 'ordinary' (shelter and warmth) into perspective. At the cusp of the old and new year, 'taking stock' and 'giving thanks' is never a bad habit. Last, we see cliffs remind us how brief and vulnerable life is. There are many things, BIG things, that prompt us to stop and ask the BIG questions of life. I find God to be like those mighty cliffs who humbles me and makes me think. I very much hope He's a tradition you rediscover in 2024 and in every year thereafter. Happy New Year to you all!

### East Woodhay Parish Council



January is the time of year when all parish councils are budgeting and agreeing what the precept (a part of your council tax) should be for the running of the parish in the forthcoming financial year. Did you know what the precept covers? Local facilities such as the maintenance of both our recreation grounds, tree maintenance, hedge cutting and maintenance of play equipment at Heath End and Woolton Hill (including CCTV), the parish field path in Woolton Hill, footpath repairs, the speed indicator, Parish Clerk, planning support and war memorials at East End and Woolton Hill etc. This financial year we have also added the Meadowbrook grass area to our maintenance contract; this includes grass cutting, hedge cutting and tree maintenance along the part bordering Tile Barn Row.

Factors we continually have to take into consideration are the ageing asset base - our play equipment will not last forever and there are times when we have to consider the cost of repair vs replacement- this requires budgeting and planning.

As you will all no doubt be aware, costs have been rising and finding contractors to deliver the work required within budget is proving harder. All of these factors have to be taken into consideration when deciding on what precept to raise from Basingstoke and Deane. The Finance Committee has worked



incredibly hard to achieve a draft budget to reflect East Woodhay Parish's growing needs- you can find the current draft on our website under Finance Committee.

We are always happy to have volunteers to help support the work of the parish council- you don't need to be a councillor!

### Memories of Woolton Hill Church Hall

t is so good to see that Woolton Hill Village Hall is now fully operational once more after the recent building works. I am aware of this as the lights from the Hall can be seen twinkling through our hedge.

I first visited the hall more than fifty years ago in 1967 when I attended a Parish Council meeting regarding a planning application. From that meeting I gradually became involved in numerous meetings and activities at the hall. One was playing badminton



with the net stretched across the hall. As I walked to the hall, I collected the keys from the Meads who lived opposite the playing fields. There are now two three-storey houses where they lived.

Woolton Hill Scouts used the hall one evening a week, as did the Brownies, Cubs and a youth club. My children Mark and Carol enjoyed taking part. During those days the Vicar, Rev. David Carter, was much involved in the Hall's activities. We enjoyed attending his church services on a regular basis.

In 1986 my wife Vi and I were invited to become organisers and caretakers of the hall.

Although we were both working full-time, we accepted the role and became responsible for all bookings, payments, and general maintenance. As I was involved in the building trade, the upkeep and repairs were undertaken by reliable and trusted tradesmen. Vi was involved in the administration of the hall and kept an eye on everything that was going on. She also became Chairperson of the local WI.

After a few years we received much help from Tony and Jane Futrell in running the hall and became very good friends with them. We were so sorry when Tony and Jane moved away a few years ago, but fully understood the circumstances.

Woolton Hill Church Hall was an enjoyable and important part of our lives for 23 years. During that time we met so many of the village locals, whom we are happy to keep in contact with today. Wonderful memories.





### The Nature Sketchbook

It is January 2024, and I have revisited my sketchbook/nature journal from January 21 to remind myself what the month ahead in nature may hold.

On the ground we can hope to see snowdrops - such cheery early flowers, holders of hope that the colder weather and the darker nights will end soon. whisperers of spring.

Whilst snowdrops are a familiar sight across the UK and are plentiful. they are not native and originate from the continent of Europe. It is not surprising that they thrive here as they enjoy damp soil! They can be found in broadleaf woodlands, meadows, along riverbanks and under my neighbour's hedge.



Snowdrops have flowers but not petals. Flower sepals are usually green and enclose a developing bud. Petals are usually coloured and are modified leaves which together form the corolla of a flower. Where these two structures are fused into one indistinguishable part these are known as tepals; snowdrop flowers are formed of these.

Overhead, we may be able to see birds of prey and in January 2021, I witnessed a kestrel hovering at the side of the road between Newbury and Basingstoke.

The kestrel is one of our smaller birds of prey, found all over the UK, where it can be seen hovering over open grassland in search of prey. It is found in highest numbers around arable farmland.

The lifespan of a kestrel is typically just 4 years although the oldest ringed bird was recorded at 15 years! Sadly, the common kestrel has experienced population decline and sits in the amber category of "UK Birds of Conservation Concern". Declining bird numbers are a natural consequence of biodiversity loss. According to "The State of Nature" report from last year, losses of UK biodiversity are significant and much of the decline in farmland birds' populations has resulted from "intensive farming practices, particularly an increase in use of pesticides and fertilisers".

At least with awareness comes progress. For example, Earth Trust are custodians of Wittenham Clumps and 500 hectares of mixed farmland near Abingdon. They aim to farm "in a climate-friendly way, working with the environment to enhance biodiversity, minimise carbon emissions and maximise soil carbon sequestration, whilst producing quality food". They also function as a hub for shared learning.

Back to 2021, when I also recorded our smallest UK bird, a tiny goldcrest, at Penwood trail. A goldcrest weighs just 6g, or 11% of an average mince pie if you have any left-over! Goldcrests are tree birds found in coniferous woodlands, feeding on

small insects. Their beaks are like cocktail sticks, ideally suited to picking out the bugs from between pine needles. This bird provides a golden headed pop of colour in an otherwise dreary winter landscape. I hope to see another this year!




